Writing, Presenting, and Processing Ministry Action Contacts (MACs)

Five Major Goals for MACs

- 1. To better understand the specific ministry incident.
- 2. To better understand yourself as a person and a minister.
- 3. To better understand the other persons involved in the incident.
- 4. To better understand where and how God was involved in the incident.
- 5. To enhance your ministry effectiveness.

Tips for Selecting an Event for Your MAC

- Select a real incident from your ministry.
- Select a "critical" experience one that was challenging, troubling, and/or is still unresolved.
- Select an experience on which you desire feedback: How did you handle it? What could you have done differently? Where do you go from here?

Tips for Writing Your MAC

- Review A Guide to Theological Reflection, chapter 7.
- Write your MAC in the third person while it is your case that happened to you, do not identify yourself.
- The incident is to be confidential; use initials or fictitious names (for yourself, other people and ministry setting) and **do not include your name on the paper.** Use a title page for the MAC copy submitted to your professor.
- Your MAC should be comprehensive, yet brief (usually between two to three type-written pages).
- Include the following format for writing your MAC:

Content of your MAC:

- 1. Describe participants: Use fictitious names for the central characters.
- 2. Describe incident: Identify an event or situation on which to reflect.
- 3. Tipping Point: What happened that led to the critical incident within the event?
- 4 Initial observation: What else is a play? What was not said? What's missing?
- 5. Awareness of others: Describe the feelings of others in the event?
- 6. Self-awareness: Describe your feelings in the event?
- 7. Issues: Explore what you think and what dynamics are at play. What are the issues?
- 8. History: Where have you experienced this before?
- 9. Holy: Find the contemporary theological meaning. Where is God in the event?

For your Professor:

- 1. The MAC with a title page plus the following:
 - a. Concluding Thoughts: What you have learned from this reflection?
 - b. Does anything need to be done now? By whom?
 - c. Has anything happened since the event occurred?

MAC Procedure in the Classroom:

- 1. Everyone reads the MAC.
- 2. Class may ask the presenter any clarifying questions.
- 3. The presenter shares what they want from this experience.
- 4. Presenter silently observes the classroom discussion.
- 5. Using the Reflection Loop, the class discusses and determines:
 - a. Theological identify beliefs, align confessed & operational theology
 - i. What does the *holy* tell you?
 - b. Theoretical identify thoughts, align them with what you know to be true
 - i. What does your head tell you?
 - c. Emotional identify feelings, align/contrast them with the desired emotional health
 - i. What does your heart tell you?
 - d. Explore Examples, Options, Opportunities
- 6. Invite the Presenter back into the discussion to share.
 - a. Updates since the MAC was written.
 - b. What did you hear? Learn? Aha moments?
 - c. Does anything need to be done now? By whom?
- 7 Final comments by the professor.
- 8 Closing prayer for all persons involved.
- 9. Student return MAC copies to the presenter.
